# **Course Description:**

This course is a hands on, laboratory class designed to help students gain confidence and competence in scenic painting skills and techniques. Areas to be covered, dependent on time, through discussion, demonstration, and exercise will include:

The tools of the trade

Color mixing

Layout techniques

Fundamentals and how to speed them along

Interpretation of designs and samples

Faux treatments (wood grain, marble, etc.)

Realistic effects (aging, etc)

Tromp l'oeil ("fool the eye"- painted 3D techniques)

Representational drawing and painting

#### Objectives:

By the end of the course, students will be knowledgeable in the tools and techniques involved in creating large scale scenic paintings, and will be able to paint faux treatments including wood grain, marble and brick. Students will also be able to demonstrate an understanding of aesthetic cues pulled from visual research that allow critical analysis of desired paint treatments.

## Textbook/ Course Materials:

While no formal text is required for the class, students will be expected to supply samples from individual research as they apply to specific projects.

Students will also be responsible for the following "tools of the trade":

A set of brushes (good quality) to be discussed in detail in class

A minimum of one 3", on 1 ½ chisel cut, and one 1" brush

A small roll of clear vinyl adhesive back shelf liner

A package (min 12) of solo cups (for paint mixing)

## Attendance Policy:

Attendance is essential as each step in the major projects builds upon the one before. If you miss a class or two, it is possible to fall way behind. You may miss 5 classes, no excuses needed. If you are absent for more than 5 classes, you cannot pass this class. There are no additional penalties for absences taken on midterm or final exam days- you may take a make-up exam outside of class time within 1 week of the missed exam (to be scheduled with me). Long term absences due to illness may be excused, with no

penalty towards your 5 absences, with a signed doctors note. The bulk of the grade for this course will be based on attendance and effort. Successful completion of the assignments is required for a passing grade in this course.

# Attendance/ participation counts for 40% of your grade.

### Quizzes/ Tests:

There will be up to 5 small pop quizzes during the semester: short simple questions that relate to the work we have done. Do not stress- if you show up and do the work, you will be fine.

QUIZZES CAN NOT BE MADE UP IF MISSED.

Quizzes count for 10% of your grade.

There will be one mid-term test, and one final exam. Each of these, just like the quizzes, will be based on the work we have done in class. Again, if you show up and do the work, you will be fine. Midterm counts for 15% of your grade. Final counts for 20% of your grade.

## Workload:

The main workload of this class will consist of demonstration/ exercises in painting techniques, working on the current shows' painting needs, and two open major projects due no later than the last day of class. (Suggested completion dates throughout the term will be provided) Though most of the work should be completed in class, it may become necessary to work on projects outside of class in order to complete them according to schedule. Know how to get in touch with Russ to schedule out-of-class time should you need it. Successful completion of the assignments is required for a passing grade in this course.

# Completion of assignments counts for 15% of your grade

#### Schedule:

The projects will be divided into sections, and each section will progress at its on pace, with pause to critique and discuss relevance of the techniques.

January: Basic techniques

Wallpaper

February: Marble tiles

Wood panels/ molding detail

March: Highlight/ shadow for 3D effects

Brick and mortar

April: Impressionist landscape recreation in scale

Additional techniques including granite with carved detail and drapery will be covered if time allows.
